On the cover: *Homeless Jesus*, Timothy Schmalz, Christ Church Cathedral, Dublin, Ireland *Homeless Jesus* is a bronze sculpture by Canadian sculptor Timothy Schmalz that depicts Jesus as a homeless person, sleeping on a park bench. His face and hands are obscured, hidden under a blanket, but crucifixion wounds on his feet reveal his identity.

The statue has been described as a visual translation of the Gospel of Matthew passage in which Jesus tells his disciple, "as you did it to one of the least of my brothers, you did it to me."

The original sculpture was installed at Regis College, University of Toronto, in early 2013 after others declined. Other casts have since been installed and blessed in many places globally, including one in Rome, outside the Papal Office of Charities, which was blessed by Pope Francis.

After the statue was installed on the grounds of St. Alban's Episcopal Church in Davidson, NC, it drew mixed reactions. One person actually called the police the first time she drove by. But the rector says the statue has earned followers, with some people coming to sit beside *Homeless Jesus*, rest their hands on his feet, and pray.

**The Rev. Kathleen Crowe** is an ordained deacon of the Episcopal Church in the Diocese of El Camino Real. Ordained at Trinity Cathedral in downtown San Jose, she is trained as a chaplain in campus ministry, pastoral care, small group facilitation, and child advocacy. Currently, she is the Episcopal Chaplain at San Jose State University where she hosts a residence for marginalized students and works with Student Affairs and the Counseling Center to provide care to students in crisis.

Before her assignment at SJSU, she facilitated a restorative justice program for the Juvenile Probation Department of SCC. . In addition to her chaplaincy at SJSU, Kathey is the retired deacon in residence at Saint Andrew's, Saratoga.



Jazz quitarist Mason Razavi is an artist with a growing profile in the SF Bay Area and beyond. Razavi's groups have performed at SF Jazz and San Jose Jazz as well as many Bay Area jazz clubs and concert series. He regularly performs with the area's top players. His albums have often featured ambitious original music that has been warmly received by jazz radio worldwide. An avid educator, Razavi is the jazz guitar professor at West Valley College and Chabot College. He has taught at De Anza College, Mission College, and Las Positas College, and maintains a private teaching studio. Razavi holds an M.A. in mu-

sic with a concentration in Jazz Studies from San Jose State University and a B.M. from the Berklee College of Music where he majored in Contemporary Writing and Production.



**Danny Gerz** is a Bay Area based acoustic and electric bassist. He received a BM in Jazz Studies from San Jose State. Gerz plays many different styles from contemporary jazz, Latin jazz, R&B, soul music, salsa, traditional jazz and big band swing.

You can catch him around the Bay with his current bands; the Yuppie Liberation Front, 7th St. Big Band, as well as the Alpha Rhythm Kings. Gerz is also a professional jazz educator with Stanford Jazz Workshop since 2017.

Gerz is a former student of jazz bass players John Shifflett, Jeff Denson, Glenn Richman. He has three AA degrees from Solano Community College, two in liberal arts and one in Music Performance. While attending Solano he played with the UC Davis Jazz big band.



Bennett Roth-Newell performs all over the Bay Area, including appearances at the top jazz festivals in California and the nation. He has taught jazz piano at San Jose State University and Contra Costa College. He also teaches piano, composition, and the fundamentals of hip-hop performance and production. Mr. Roth-Newell is the pianist for two the San Jose-based jazz groups and sings with the Bay Area R&B band Soulful Obsession and has also produced and written for numerous hip-hop and R&B artists. In his performing career, he has played alongside some of jazz's topflight musicians.



John Worley Jr. is an accomplished trumpet/flugelhorn/ post-horn artist and band leader. John is an engaging educator with insight to a wide range of ages, experience levels, and proficiencies.

He has played in many of the Bay Area's creative music ensembles, as well as on over 70 recordings and videos and several music series and festivals. John has played with and backed up national and international artists in North America, Europe, and Central America. as well as John is a member of the music faculty at: Stanford University in Stanford, CA; Hope St. Music Studios in Mountain View, CA; and a faculty member of the San Jose Summer Jazz Camp.

John was included in the book, Trumpet Greats, a biography of 2,200 trumpet players from the year 1600 to the present.
